

Mixing GIS and Text Analytics for Better Insight

Geographic information systems (GIS) are digital technologies for storing, analyzing, and displaying, geographic information. They allow one to reveal the spatial and geographical nature of complex social phenomena through the production of static and dynamic maps. These tools often use data that is quantitative or categorical in nature. They are less well suited for leveraging the richness of information stored in unstructured text data such as interview transcripts, tweets, crime narratives, customer feedback, field notes, or in photographic images.

Computer assisted qualitative data analysis software (CAQDAS) and text analytics techniques have proven more valuable for extracting insightful information from such unstructured sources. They can provide rich details for better understanding complex social phenomena, such as people's perceptions and interpretations, or reveal hidden factors or unexpected connections underlying those phenomena.

Provalis Research's QDA Miner and WordStat provide a unique integration of GIS mapping, qualitative analysis and text analytics features, allowing one to relate unstructured text data with geographic information to create maps, timelines, and other graphic displays to enhance your analysis and presentations. The software is equally adept at utilizing location-based data embedded in text, linked with another source or stored separately from the unstructured text.



Make full use of geographic information embedded in text and images

It can be very challenging and time-consuming to extract geographic information embedded in text and images to produce comprehensive geographic representations. However, by using QDA Miner's computer assisted features, you can extract references to geographic locations in unstructured text such as names of cities, towns, regions, states, provinces, countries and other geographic locations to create maps. By attaching time tags to text segments or image areas, you can also create timelines to visually present themes or events in a chronological sequence. These features are being used by crime analysts, legal experts, historians, literary scholars, geographers and many others. Here is how it works.

Step 1 - GEOTAGGING

GEOTAG DOCUMENTS

- Manually attach geographic coordinates as well as date and time to text segments.
- Search location from gazetteers or insert coordinates by pasting Google Earth placemarks.

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IMPORT AND CODE IMAGES

- Import photos in JPEG and PNG as well as images from GIS software along with their coordinates.
- Associate geographic coordinates, dates and times to image areas.

Step 2 - RETRIEVING

RETRIEVE GEOTAGS

- Search and retrieve all geo-tags or time-tags in your entire project.
- Filter on a specific time period or on a distance from a geographic location.

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EXTRACT LOCATIONS AND DATES

- Automatically extract from documents all references to locations, dates and times.
- Attach codes with corresponding geographic or time tag to retrieved segments.



Step 3 - VISUALIZING

DISPLAY GEOTAGS ON A MAP

- Export retrieved geographic locations into KMZ or KML file and display them in Google Earth, ArcView, or ArcGIS.
- Create thematic maps or heatmaps using the integrated GIS Viewer.

Geographic information associated with one's core research can also be stored or referenced separately as metadata in accompanying fields. WordStat 7 and QDA Miner 5.0 feature a geocoding service to convert city names, postal codes and even IP addresses into latitudes and longitudes. One may then use the GIS mapping and editing module to relate such information to themes, topics, keywords and key phrases automatically extracted or manually coded. One can build maps to display the spatial distribution of themes, identify trends, customer concentrations, crime hotspots, demographic shifts, or any other geographic representation tailored to your research data.

• Organize information chronologically by automatically generating timelines from time tags.

• Link back from any timeline marker to the associated text segment or image area.
